

To all those who attended, I hope you can all see how this parish has grown through the grace of God— how God has moved in this community in the last 100 years, God's merciful Love is greater than all of that! Remember last week's Gospel—Jesus says, "I am the vine, you are the branches.

He who abides in me, and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing." The good fruits that this parish community has borne over the last 100 years is God Himself working in us and through us—it is Him bearing fruit in us—for His own purposes. And HE HAS NO EQUAL!

Let us draw strength and confidence from this truth.

Archbishop Michael gave such a beautiful homily—and I want to share it here. Not only for those who missed it, but for everyone because his words warrant a deeper reflection.

As we commemorate the 100th anniversary when the first church erected to honor Mary, Star of the Sea, was dedicated by then Archbishop Timothy Casey on the 4th of May 1924, we rightly look to our past with enormous gratitude.





God is truly great and has done marvelous deeds over the long history in this parish for you and with you. For this we give him thanks and praise.

From its very humble beginnings of a few Catholic families who wanted, and indeed built, the first church in White Rock, and subsequently, over the years, other churches – this beautiful one – an extraordinary Catholic school, this parish has grown into a large and a vibrant community of faith. Indeed, what has taken place here in South Surrey recalls what happened in the Church after Pentecost.

An analogy can be applied from the Book of Acts, to the history of Star of the Sea Parish. Acts records the church throughout Judea, Galilee and Samaria (and South Surrey) had peace and was built up. Living in the fear of the Lord and the comfort of the Holy Spirit, it increased in numbers.

Recalling your parish's history with thanksgiving is essential for preserving your strong identity as a place of Christ's presence, especially in the Eucharist, and for





strengthening your unity as a family united in worship, community, and outreach to others.

More than an exercise in nostalgia, although it is a bit of that, celebrating a centenary looks to following in the footsteps of past generations in order to continue to implement the mission, the vision and the values which inspired them, all of which, of course, were founded in the Gospel. Down through the years, you, this parish, have done this relentlessly despite not insignificant challenges that you have also had to confront as a parish, as every family does.

In particular, we give thanks to the good Lord for this precious inheritance of 100 years, when the life- giving power of the Holy Spirit has animated, over the years, the zealous pastors and priests. And certainly, here I recall especially most recent pastors, Father Jim Fagan, Father Stan Galvon, Father Glenn Dion, and Father Augustine Obiwumma.

We should also recall the earlier days the committed religious sisters.



HELLO SJP2 FAMILY AND DEAR

SUPPORTERS

My name is Lisa Van Vliet and my husband, Troy, is the founder of our incredible High School, St John Paul II Academy, now in it's 6th year of operations in our temporary campus in White Rock.

I was asked to write our family's story for SJP2's year end correspondence likely due to that fact that recently, our daughter, Annika, and I were invited to speak at the CISVA Expo for life. There were select students in attendance from over 20 schools. The organizers of the event found Annika's story inspirational as she was featured in many publications (including the front page of the BC Catholic) on news stations, in advertisements and garnered much attention for her International achievements in the modelling world, walking many runways including Paris Fashion Week, and appearing on the Jumbotrons in Times Square, NY during NYFW. (New York Fashion Week)

The reason this was particularly newsworthy is because our daughter was born with an extra copy of her 21st chromosome. Annika has Down Syndrome.

Down Syndrome can cause social, academic and physical challenges throughout life. It causes hypotonia, an extra flexibility that displays itself due to low muscle tone. This affects fine motor, speech clarity and balance.

Let me back up about 16.5 years, though.



My husband Troy, and I already had been blessed with a young baby girl, Tayla (our eldest daughter) and we were thrilled to be welcoming another baby into our lives.

After confirming my pregnancy, I attended a standard 12 week Ultrasound and was puzzled by the Ultrasound technician's curt behavior.

I chalked it up to questionable bedside manner and left the office being instructed to wait for results.

The results came by phone and were quite concerning, so I requested a formal report to be sure I had the correct information and what I read in it was completely unexpected.

There were markers that showed our baby had a high probability of holoprosencephaly. This condition occurs when the frontal lobe of the brain fails to divide into 2 hemispheres, causing a single enlarged eye in the Center of the face, no nose, no mouth and the baby asphyxiates at birth, being unable to get oxygen. This is where the term, cyclopia comes from, as in "Cyclops."

I was provided no information at the time that this condition can present itself to varying degrees and it can, in rare & mild cases, be a survivable diagnosis, all I was told was the worst case scenario prognosis of time-of-birth imminent passing of our child and that the diagnosis was "Not compatible with life."

Due to our faith as Catholics and the fact that I was adopted as a baby in the late 60's (at a time when young Mothers were not socially accepted) this has remained a sacred fact of my existence. I am here solely because my biological mother decided to give me life and

relinquish me for adoption and a chance at a happy, stable and loving life. (Which I've had •).

When I contacted the Doctor for clarification, I was berated and told "just to take care of it as soon as possible" as the diagnosis was "not compatible with life."

Subsequent visits with my OB/Gyn were quiet and guarded, as we navigated the inevitable road ahead.

It was scary, but I never wavered from the knowing that this was God's will. I am meant to gain and lose and learn the blessings from whatever is going to happen! We carried on loving, nurturing and growing our precious baby inside my womb. She didn't "feel" different than Tayla did. How could this be? Perhaps denial, perhaps a divine KNOWING that all would play out in God's timing and on HIS terms. As his servant, I am here solely to see his plans to fruition.

When I visited the medical genetics department, my world shattered. Not due to the fact of our current diagnosis, but because they "reassured" me that I could still "take care of it" (Abort our child!!) until 25 weeks gestation!

I gave it to God, offering thanks for an experience that was sure to strengthen me and our family as a unit- regardless of the outcome.

Many weeks and thousands of prayers later, we had a more definitive test that showed us our Dear Annika had an extra copy of her 21st chromosome!

Praise God! Our beloved baby will survive her birth process!!

No holoprosencephaly!!

Then my husbands cousin lost her sweet baby girl in utero at 6 months pregnant.
We were also 6 months pregnant with Annika!

We attended the funeral and prayed over her tiny white casket... surrounded by family.

The moment came back to me.
I tried to push it away, but it was whispering to me, urging me to address it.

It was the Doctor's voice urging "because this pregnancy resulted in a genetic defect, we have 2 more weeks to terminate for you.



She will never have a quality life. She will be a burden. It's okay, just give us a call"

Finally it hit me. AT the funeral. I froze.

My heart dropped into my stomach.

What a vast difference of value for life. 2
babies, same gestational age of 6 months.

One grieved by a packed church filled with love, another considered "easily disposed of and defective."

The baby girl who went home to be with our Lord was named Jillian.

And so it became our Annika's middle name in her honour.

I'd like to think that Jillian is pleased by this tribute to her 💞

We definitely feel like Annika has a guardian angel.

We are committed to providing Annika with every opportunity she wishes to pursue. We still navigate a cruel world where, if Annika needed an organ transplant, she would be flatly DENIED. Due to being a "genetically defective" subject.

An acquaintance of ours was just denied a heart for their baby with heart issues requiring a transplant. Just a "NO."

Your beloved child does NOT QUALIFY for life saving measures!!

And then there is the whole social aspect to having a child with a disability or who is neurodivergent. The elementary years are far more forgiving, as differences can be washed away by the rain in the playground and the chaos that is childhood offers more opportunity to bond with other students.

We knew High School would be an entirely different world.

Well, the endless blessings that got us to this point of the campus project have been astounding!

From the Archdiocese providing land, to the perfect selection of faculty to engaging precious families to join us on this educational journey, we know this entire project was beautifully blessed and happened in divine ways with divine timing!

We really can't express enough thanks to everyone who played a role in getting us to where we were today to suffice! The "little school that could" is morphing into "the state of the art campus that DID!"

There is still so much work and advocacy to be done. Both for the new campus and for the rights and dignity of those who were born with challenges. Please lend compassion to families who are supporting a loved one facing a diagnosis.

Advocacy is a wonderful tool, yet it is exhausting. I once had a lady at church tell me "Well, it sure helps that you dress her nice, at least!"

Helps WHAT?? Helps YOU to be more comfortable in her presence? helps you to see her as less offensive, somehow??

I could curl your hair with countless tales of ridiculous encounters, but we choose to focus on the positive experiences we've had.

Annika and Tayla both attended Star of the Sea elementary, with their fabulous supports for learning. She has been provided with a one on one Educational Assistant since pre-K in the private system, but many of her peers in public schools do not have the staff support provided to them currently.



Educators are in low supply right now and it's the vulnerable who pay the price! Also, the maximum Government support for an adult with a disability benefit is ONLY \$200/month!! Can you imagine supporting yourself on that in 2024??? WE won't live forever, and if Annika doesn't secure employment, how will she survive? This is what every disabled person in BC is facing right now. It is absolutely appalling how little value is placed on some lives. So we are doing what we can to try and elevate all people facing discrimination and lack of respect.

Every single time Annika breaks a glass ceiling, it opens the world up for those like her and others. She is not working to garner fame and riches. she is doing what she loves and earns a better living doing it than she would with a typical teen part time job. You can follow Annika's story on IG.

We are here to elevate all people facing challenges. A true test for someone's character is how they treat our Annika. It never fails. We only believe in looking down at someone if we're offering a hand to help them UP!! Let's all vow to do better by vulnerable members of our community. A smile and a Hello go much farther than anyone realizes. Being invisible or being "talked over" is a slight that takes hold over time, delivering the recipient a hit that develops their sense of self based on others' poor treatment or devaluing of them.

God created everyone for a reason. On purpose. We all have gifts! Try to share yours with the world! Nobody has what you have. I deeply thank you for reading our story and being a supportive part of our lives.

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SOCIAL JUSTICE TEAM UPDATE

What does your God ask of you? To ACT justly, to LOVE mercy and walk HUMBLY. Micah 6: 8

On May 14th, we had the special privilege to travel to Vancouver College with 4 Grade 12 students who had previously been involved in a "Service to Advocacy" workshop. The day began with a very informative and passionate presentation by Judy Graves who received an honorary degree from UBC because of her work with the homeless. "In her career as a housing advocate for the City of Vancouver, she sought to obtain a better understanding of the circumstances of those she was trying to help, and the causes of their marginalization."

Our Grade 12 students presented a plan for an awareness campaign about homelessness, but couldn't finish it due to time constraints. We've decided to continue their efforts next year by organizing an event where participants sleep outside for a night to raise awareness and empathy for the homeless. This will take a lot of planning, but we're confident we can make it happen.







To keep our sandwich making programme going we need money, so we hosted a very successful bake sale, and we have one more fundraiser organized for the last week of school. We are grateful to the Knights of Columbus as they have been very generous and have helped us sustain this project. Our work has focused on direct service, such as providing sandwiches to the unhoused. While we want to move from "Service to Advocacy" we feel it is important to continue with this initiative. Encouraged by the words of Judy Graves, we are establishing a connection with the people we serve regularly. We want to know their stories.

As members of our Social Justice Team, we are called to live out the Gospel values of compassion, empathy, and action. It's time for us to expand our mission from service to advocacy, raising awareness and addressing the root causes of homelessness.

ATHLETIC'S DIRECTOR

As the year comes to a close, we at St John Paul II Academy are very proud of our athletic accomplishments. We had over 82% of our students actively involved in at least one extra-curricular school sport, and we competed at several different levels of competition in six BC Schools Sports. This has culminated in 4 banners this year alone, and 10 banners since the school's inception just 6 years ago when it opened its doors to 16 students!

This past year, our fall sports included cross country and volleyball. A highlight was our Sr Girls A Cross Country team, who won Surrey, South Frasers and the BC Provincial title! This was our school's first provincial title and it was very exciting. We also had three volleyball teams; JR Girls, SR Girls and SR Boys. All had successful seasons and many tournaments.

Our winter sport was Sr Boys Basketball which is always a lot of fun. Spring sports included a huge interest in ultimate frisbee. We were able to field two Jr Teams and one Sr Team that competed in the first BC Catholics tournament since covid. Our Tennis team qualified for provincials but was unable to defend last year's AA title.

Our Senior Girls won our 10th banner at the Surrey Championship, with a record 12 provincial qualifiers who will compete at the provincial track meet in Nanaimo in early June.

One of our graduating students has been recognized for her track excellence.
Veronica Dee will be attending SFU in the fall on a track scholarship!

MADONNA HOUSE VANCOUVER

In his memorable homily, the archbishop issued a passionate call to the members of MH to live fully the Little Mandate given by the Holy Spirit to the foundress, Catherine Doherty. In this way, he expected them to become saints!

In 2007, MH moved from the house on the grounds of Rosemary Heights Retreat Center in Surrey, close to Star of the Sea parish, to a house across the street from St. John the Apostle parish in Vancouver. Looking back, we marvel at God's work in creating among the MH members a community of love into which all are welcome and in which all can experience the transforming love of God.

THE LITTLE MANDATE

Arise – go! Sell all you possess.

Give it directly, personally to the poor.

Take up My cross (their cross) and follow Me, going to the poor, being poor, being one with them, one with Me.

Little – be always little! Be simple, poor, childlike.

Preach the Gospel with your life – without compromise!

Listen to the Spirit. He will lead you.

Do little things exceedingly well for love of Me.

Love...love...love, never counting the cost.

Go into the marketplace and stay with Me. Pray, fast. Pray always, fast.

Be hidden. Be a light to your neighbour's feet.

Go without fears into the depths of men's hearts. I shall be with you.

Pray always. I will be your rest.

This new foundation was made possible through the generosity of Msgr. Gregory Smith, Fr. Stanley Galvon, and several members of the Star of the Sea Parish. The Knights of Columbus and the CWL worked hard to renovate a garage into a chapel, and to prepare a space for all who came to pray at Madonna House. Since those first days, many different staff members have served in the archdiocese for varying lengths of time.

At present, those assigned to Madonna House Vancouver are (as seen in the photo (L-R) Philomena Lim from Singapore, Lisa Diniz from India, and Emmanuella Kim from Korea.

Perhaps you are wondering, what is Madonna House? We are a Catholic community of laymen, women, and priests, whose lives are modeled after the Holy Family, who served in hidden ways in Nazareth to form a community of love. Our foundress, Servant of God Catherine de Hueck Doherty, a refugee from the communist revolution in Russia, is a saint for our times, who overcame challenges in several nations and cultures. Catherine was a pioneer in the lay apostolate in North America and a leader in social justice in Canada and the USA, establishing the Friendship House movement in the 1930s and 1940s.

In 1943 she married Irish-American newspaper reporter Eddie Doherty. Supported by her husband, she founded the Madonna House Apostolate in Combermere, Ontario in 1947.

The little community has now grown to include 7 missions in Canada, 4 in the US, and 3 international locations.

Members receive the PAX-CARITAS cross upon making promises to live the evangelical counsels of poverty, chastity, and obedience, eventually for life.





Catherine's writings are a powerful testimony of God's work in the ordinary and inspire hope in every situation. She referred to MH as "the people of the towel and water," having taught the members to serve as Jesus instructed his disciples to do at the Last Supper. Such service takes creative forms in Vancouver, from monthly mornings of recollection, neighborhood music concerts and garden gatherings to service at the parish, assisting with faith formation and being available for fellowship. When needed, MH staff are extraordinary ministers of the Holy Eucharist to the housebound.

Catherine envisioned MH as a place to restore all things in Christ. Its members are readily available to those who come to their door (painted blue in honour of Our Lady). Some stop by for chitchat over a cup of tea or coffee. Friends come to help with gardening and share in the celebration of saints' days or for an Epiphany party. The community of love extends to the local neighborhood, where staff have babysat for families or taken the elderly to medical appointments. MH Vancouver has a lending library that offers a wonderful selection of books by the foundress and many other spiritual writers.



Catholic high school students have volunteered in different ways, including gardening, helping with parish lunch for seniors, and making pysanky (Ukrainian Easter eggs) during Lent.

Many friends helped build the poustinia (desert in Russian), a small hermitage where one can fast and pray for a day. It is a place of spiritual restoration, where a person can sit with the Word of God and let the Word penetrate, heal, and restore the soul. Renewed and strengthened, one can then go forth and serve anew.

People from the archdiocese have visited the main center in Combermere, Ontario for clergy retreats, a family retreat in the summer, or for an extended time of personal immersion in MH community life.

CITY OF FOCUS

We all know we should not judge people on superficialities like the way they look, dress, who they associate with, where they shop, which school they attended, or what car they drive. However, this does not stop us from doing exactly that and, more often than not, we make the wrong assumptions. I am mindful of the aphorism, "People are so judgemental; you can just tell by looking at them!"

Here are some examples, taken from contemporary life and history, in which appearances are vastly misleading.

The outer appearance: An older volunteer who sets up readings, furniture, and program sheets for the daily Masses at a local church and is often mistaken for the custodian.

A leading businessman in the city who lives a quiet unassuming life.

A banker and stockbroker who lived in London, England, in the 1940's. A day laborer in his sixties in Alexandria, Egypt, in 600 AD.

The unseen truth: This older volunteer is a retired neurosurgeon who was the tenured UBC Professor and Head of Neurosurgery for 12 years at the UBC Division of Neurosurgery and its hospitals.

This businessman has for years anonymously visited and befriended prisoners both in and out of prison.

This banker and stockbroker, Nicholas Winton (<u>née</u> Wertheim), assisted in the rescue of 669 children, most of them <u>Jewish</u>, on the eve of <u>World War II</u>. On a brief visit to Czechoslovakia, he helped compile a list of children in danger of persecution.



After returning home, he worked to fulfill the legal requirements of bringing those children to Britain and finding homes and sponsors for them. His humanitarian accomplishments remained unknown and unnoticed by the world for nearly 50 years until 1988.

This day laborer was a monk called Vatalis of Gaza. At the age of sixty, Vitalis traveled to the city of Alexandria, Egypt, where he hired himself out as a day laborer. Legend states that each night he would take his daily wage to one of the many prostitutes in the city and offer her a night's respite from her work. He would pass the night in conversation and, when she slept, he would pray for her.[This practice was condoned by the Church, and many of the prostitutes he ministered to abandoned their profession and became wives and mothers.

As we walk through life, let us not assume we know someone solely by their outward appearance. All the people mentioned above were followers of Jesus and were being guided by His love and calling on their lives.

"But the LORD said to Samuel, ...The LORD does not look at the things people look at. People look at the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart." I Samuel 16:7

HEADSUPGUYS: SUPPORTING MEN'S MENTAL HEALTH

HeadsUpGuys is an online resource dedicated to preventing suicide and supporting men in their fight against depression. Our mission is to improve mental health literacy among men, reduce stigma, and provide strategies for effective selfmanagement, ultimately inspiring men to live healthier lives.

The need for HeadsUpGuys became apparent when a survey in a doctor's office revealed that men frequently experienced suicidal thoughts but did not share these with their doctors. This discovery led to the creation of an anonymous online platform tailored specifically for men and their families.

Our website offers practical tips and articles that equip men with tools to combat depression, along with recovery stories from men who have faced similar struggles. Additionally, our international therapist directory helps men connect with local mental health professionals. We offer self-guided courses on mindfulness, anger management, relationship skills, and managing negative thoughts, and we are currently expanding our suite of tools to include more interactive assessments that gauge stress in key areas like relationships, work, and finances, providing personalized feedback and advice.

The importance of our mission is underscored by alarming statistics: men die by suicide at three times the rate of women in Canada, the US, and the UK, and suicide is a leading cause of death for men under 50.

Men are also much less likely than women to seek help for their mental health, with over 75% of men completing our Self Check meeting the criteria for probable depression.

HeadsUpGuys was developed to address these unique challenges and fill a critical gap in mental health services for men. Our content is derived from evidence-based research and includes perspectives from both clinicians and patients to ensure its accuracy and relatability. We envision a world where men prioritize their mental health and suicide is no longer a leading cause of death for men of any age.

Founded by Dr. John Ogrodniczuk, a Professor of Psychiatry and the Director of the Psychotherapy Program at the University of British Columbia (UBC), HeadsUpGuys operates as a program under UBC's Vancouver Campus on the traditional territory of the xwməθkwəýəm (Musqueam) people. Since its launch in 2015, our resource has reached over 4,500,000 visits from countries around the world.

HeadsUpGuys supports men's mental health in a positive, inclusive, and mutually supportive way, welcoming individuals of all backgrounds regardless of gender, race, or sexual orientation. We do not support discrimination or Men's Rights Activism and stand against misogyny.

Our operational costs are funded exclusively through private donations, allowing us to continue providing this vital resource to men globally.

Emotional and Social Harmony

Music has a profound emotional impact, especially for those living with dementia who often feel isolated and disconnected. A familiar song can evoke memories of special moments, providing comfort and a sense of continuity. Imagine the joy on your grandmother's face as she hears the song that played at her wedding, her eyes lighting up with recognition. This emotional connection can alleviate loneliness and foster a sense of community and belonging.

Creating personalized playlists, tailored to the individual's tastes and memories, can amplify this effect. By including songs that hold personal significance, caregivers can unlock a treasure chest of emotions and memories.

LADY OF THE MOUNTAIN

Whistler Catholic Community's journey began in December 1986 with the aspiration to construct a Catholic Church, starting with a multipurpose center and later envisioning a new church.

In June 2021, the parish community, inspired by a few individuals, voted overwhelmingly in support of building a new church at Our Lady of the Mountains Parish. This vision aims to create a magnificent spiritual destination, attracting national and international Catholic events while also serving the local community with daycare facilities and meeting spaces.

Through dedicated fundraising efforts, over \$4.5 million has been pledged and raised, surpassing 91% of the \$5 million goal solely through private donations. The community's generosity and commitment have propelled this project forward in just over a year of active fundraising, without financial assistance from the Diocese of Kamloops.





The design process, overseen by the Building committee and Church design committee, has evolved through multiple revisions to incorporate feedback from the community and professionals, emphasizing the spiritual and educational significance of various church elements.





KORLE-BU NEUROSCIENCE FOUNDATION

Twenty-four years ago, I was approached in the VGH Neuro ICU by a young Ghanaian neurosurgeon who was participating in a year-long neurosurgery fellowship sponsored by the University of British Columbia Division of Neurosurgery. He was the first Ghanaian neurosurgeon wholly trained in country. Dr. Dakurah asked: Would I consider coming to Ghana to train his nurses? A neuroscience nurse educator at the time, I immediately felt that this was something that I was destined to do. I reached out to my nursing colleagues and a neurosurgery project was born.

Prior to his departure, a list of needs was compiled and within weeks, educational resources, medical consumables, beds and equipment were donated by the Ministry of Health and enroute to Ghana.









Fast forward to today, Korle-Bu Neuroscience Foundation (KBNF) a registered BC non-profit since 2002, as the governance foundation for 2 Canadian charities, collaborates with five national governments and local partners to develop neuroscience care in West Africa. Our foundation pillars include education and training, shipping of medical equipment and supplies, neurosurgical missions and infrastructure development.

Our purpose is to enhance the delivery and quality of healthcare in West Africa. We provide medical supplies, services, and training that would otherwise be unavailable.

Our focus is to develop fully equipped, staffed, and self-sustaining neuroscience programs and facilities.







Building neurosurgery in any country is daunting. Consequently, KBNF is one of the only foundations (and in some cases the only foundation) doing what we are doing in West Africa. We serve only where we are invited, either by Heads of State, government ministries, university administrators, hospital administrators or neuro specialists. Our principal nations include Ghana, Nigeria, Liberia, Sierra Leone, and The Gambia.

Everything comes at a cost. What motivates KBNF to rise to seemingly insurmountable challenges and deliver expert compassionate care is purpose - embracing the principle that we are born to serve. Serving is a privilege. Heart powered service – caring with your heart, caring with compassion, - reaches the deepest crevices of the soul. Someone cares. Someone really cares about me.

One of our neurosurgery missions to Tappita in the eastern region of Liberia required one of our mission neurosurgeons to transport from the airport 4 hours to Gunta by a health service vehicle, followed by transfer to a trailblazer truck capable of handling rugged roads for the next 4 hour portion of the journey. Entrenched in muck and mire enroute, a second rugged truck was expedited and when embedded once again,

a motorcycle was dispatched. Through the darkness of night, while carrying surgery tools on his back, Dr. Bankole was successfully transported through the jungle to Tappita. And nary a complaint. Our KBNF neurosurgeons and team share this common quality, they are all fearless trailblazers, and they care.

KBNF entered 2023 conducting our 33rd West African mission including our 8th Liberian neurosurgery mission. One patient particularly pressed me daily to be given the opportunity to share his story. Having renewed independence due to restorative spine fixation during our 2022 neurosurgery mission (after being homebound for 7 years due to mobility issues), Thomas was back to have the second phase of spine stabilization on a different vertebrae level conducted. Prior to my departure, I captured his story. With tears in his eyes and his voice broken with emotion, he shared how when he had had no way going forward to financially afford surgery, his life had been restored by KBNF. Advocating for others similarly trapped by encouraging donors of the dramatic impact their support reaches, was his priority.



I am asked how we can be sure that we are building sustainable health care. My answer, we partner with champions. In my books, a champion is a visionary who takes the meagre resources they have and takes the first steps to create an altruistic dream.

My favorite example is a KBNF partner Dr. Gladstone Kessie, founder and director of Mt. Olives Hospital in the interior of Ghana. He dreamed of building a Heart Powered hospital that would open their doors to serve the community and the poor. Dr. Kessie purchased property, a miracle in itself, and on weekends, when he had the funds, he and his wife built bricks.

Thousands of bricks. And when he had enough bricks to start construction, a hospital was built. And KBNF provided the hospital contents. The doors opened, and today, up to 7,000 patients attend Mt. Olives monthly.









A heart powered saying I have adapted from a quote by Edward Everett Hale (1902) cousin of Helen Keller resonates with all our African family:

I am only one, but still I am one, I cannot do everything, but I can do something,

And I will choose to do the something that I can do.

Everyone can do something, but it's a choice. KBNF makes choices every day. And delivers on those choices. We are /nurturing hope, confidence, and the possibility that dreams both near and abroad may just become reality.
