

Dear Friends,





GROWING THE NEXT GENERATION OF

CATHOLIC WOMEN - WHO IS DOING IT?

We are witnessing a rediscovery of true womanhood emerging, where women are seeking happiness within their relationships, their families, and within themselves. Women are reaching out to new opportunities to grow their faith, whether it be online in group chats or in-person through small meetings or larger conventions. But we must also recognize women have struggled to find their footing in a changing secular society.

In 2023, Catholic author Carrie Gress wrote a book titled "The End of Women" (ISBN:978-1-68451-529-5). She shares the history and impact of feminism and how women are increasingly dissatisfied with their lives. Data shows 70% of all divorces are initiated by women. Suicide, depression, substance abuse, and other societal ills, have increased in the past 5 decades. For such negative trends, there is light in a complex ever changing world, especially for women of faith.

This begs the questions: Who can help grow the next generation of strong Catholic women in a post Christendom world? Where should Catholic women turn for guidance, relevant resources, leadership and a community of sisterhood? Let's look at the options available in women ministries.

Women Ministries

Many ministry options are open to women and should be explored. However, one may find the current majority are online based with a narrow scope or focus, offer few inperson community experiences, and lack the depth or consistency required to bolster and sustain a woman's Catholic faith for a lifetime.

Also, many of the ministries available are headquartered in the USA and in Western Europe, where the cost to join is high (for Canadian women) due to fluctuating currency conversion rates and their events are typically located near their headquarters. In Canada, there is one which encompasses many of your expectations in one place: The Catholic Women's League of Canada (CWL).

Do you really know CWL?

With a rich history of 100 + years of tradition and a voice for the marginalized through our resolution efforts in Ottawa, our value add proposition for members today is as strong as the women in the League.

Our focus is on 3 core purposes: Faith, Service, and Social Justice. Catholic women of all ages, show up for our purposes in different ways, backgrounds, and interests. Whether it is hosting a faith retreat or an online education webinar, or a social event like a Parish potluck or cleaning up a local beach, writing to our local MLA, we are present, eager to be involved and positively influencing our communities.

CWL value in a fractured western society

Recently, an article appeared in the New York Times (as part of a series, Believing) entitled "Believing and Belonging" by Lauren Jackson, May 4th, 2025. The author shared that religion offers people three B's: Beliefs, behaviors, and Belonging (in a community or culture). Everyone wants to belong in rich, profound, and sustained ways she writes.

We often hear how people feel disconnected and alone in an increasingly "connected" virtual world and how they are now turning to faith based communities to support them

After the Pandemic, we have seen the societal impact of isolation and distancing ourselves from one another. Scripture tells us we are built for community – John 13: 34 and 35 "I give you a new commandment: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." There will always be a deep spiritual need for authentic human interaction.

Women find the true and genuine connection in the CWL. Our ladies support each other through heading to college, getting married, the birth of children and family life, and even when we lose our parents and our spouses. Mothers and daughters find shared faith, common ground and interests when participating in CWL. As you can see in action, CWL women are women supporting women throughout their lives.



Thinking about your future?

If you are a woman 16 years old and older, and you are not a CWL member, you owe it to yourself to check CWL out. If you are a mother with a teenage daughter, there are tons of benefits to having her involved in CWL – exposing her to Catholic women practicing their faith, access to bursaries, volunteering, networking, and growing a lifetime of beneficial skills.

Maybe next time you are in mass, ask the lady sitting next to you in the pew or at the social time after mass, if she is a member of CWL. You may be surprised to find you are surrounded by them. Or maybe the Holy Spirit is encouraging (or nudging you), it's time to grow and expand your faith journey with CWL.

CHARLOTTE MARY SEARS

Charlotte Mary Sears was born on October 19, 2011 in Lions Gate Hospital in North Vancouver to Ben and Camilla Sears.

At 3 days old she was diagnosed with profound hearing loss and was completely deaf.

We began work in audiology booths at BC Children's at 6 months old and she's been there for the last 13 years since.

At 3 years old, her mother Camilla was diagnosed with Breast Cancer and just over 2 years later she passed away after a single night in Marjorie Snowden Hospice in Kamloops BC.

I moved her back to south surrey and enrolled her at Star of the Sea Parish school for grades 1-7.

The IEP program there coordinated seamlessly with the Cochlear Implant and audiology department at BCCH and Charlotte was raised in a mainstream environment accessing sound through bilateral N8 cochlear implants. Her audio-verbal therapist Maureen Clarke was miraculously committed to Charlotte's progress and drove from North Vancouver to South Surrey to work with her at School.





Unfortunately, Charlotte herself was diagnosed with Acute lymphoblastic Leukemia barely a year after her own mother's death. Raised by a single father with the incredible support of her Parish School she endured over 2 years of intensive intrathecal chemotherapy.

Her last year of treatment was the first year of the covid pandemic and much of 2020 was spent in the strange and difficult hospital environments that brought.

But in August of 2020 she received her last treatment and is looking forward to August of 2025 when she will no longer be under the care and treatment of the oncologists at BCCH and will be considered finally cancer free.

When the world opened up again in 2022 Charlotte joined Ocean Athletics Track and Field Club and found an early aptitude for the disciplines Discus and Hammer throw.

She worked one on one with her incredible coach David Mcdonald who helped her achieve a love of the sport and multiple personal bests throughout her Junior competitions. In her final year of elementary school she won Gold medal in discuss at the CISVA Track and Field meet and achieved a national top 10 ranking for her age.

She's in grade 8 now at her beloved high school which her family have supported since its inception. She loves playing volleyball, listening to K-pop, travelling (including her recent Make-a-wish trip to Orlando Florida).





THE NIGHT OF THE EASTER VIGIL

"On the night of the Easter Vigil, 27 adults (and 1 baby)

from our parish, along with untold numbers of men, women and children across the globe were baptized into Jesus' death and rise to new life with Him. These adults (along with 8 others who were received into full communion with the Church through the Sacraments of Eucharist and Confirmation) have been preparing for many months were on that night transferred from the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of God's beloved Son (see Col 1:13)

This is no mere ceremony. Something really happens to a person when he gets baptized, because before the waters of the baptismal font is poured over them, they are asked a series of questions, to which they must answer in the affirmative out loud: "Do you believe in God, the Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth? Do you believe in Jesus Christ, His only Son our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried, rose from the dead, ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God the Father Almighty? Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body and life everlasting?"





Then, right after the baptismal celebrations at the Vigil (and on Easter Sunday for those who didn't attend the Vigil), all those present are invited to renew their baptismal promises. The same questions are posed to them and they, too, are invited to respond "I do!" The key word there is "invited." Only if they are willing should they say, "I do!" And only if they mean it.



This ceremony traces many of its origins back to the Roman Legion. A man became a Legionary in a formal ceremony. By means of this ceremony the man's status changed; he was no longer a civilian but a member of the Legion. At the center of the ceremony was a solemn oath. The oath was one of fidelity – allegiance – unto death to the Emperor, and was sworn before the "standard" (or flag) of the Legion. It was renewed each year, usually on the occasion of the accession of the Emperor, that is, on the anniversary of his coming into power.

The ceremony was called a sacramentum. Sound familiar? When the early Church was looking for a word that best encapsulated what happened at baptism it drew on this ceremony of the Roman Legion. Because indeed, what happens in baptism is truly a change of identity – one that is far more than the transition from civilian to Legionary. What we started at the Easter Vigil night, we continue to celebrate every Sunday of the year—that is, Resurrection Day—the day that changed everything for all mankind: the coming into power of the true Emperor, the true King and only Lord of heaven and earth, the Conqueror of Sin, Death and Satan: Jesus



This is why at Easter, just as in the days of old in the Roman Empire, we are invited to renew our pledge of allegiance to Him before the "standard" of the cross. But only if we want to. It cannot be forced. No one can become Christian by birth. Nor can we become Christian because our parents were. Nor can we become Christian by baptism alone, without a declaration of faith.





Each of us can only become Christian by a free choice—a personal decision that nobody else can make for us. Part and parcel of this choice is the acknowledgement that all we profess in the Creed at every Mass is true. Involved also in this decision is a promise of loyalty to the King—a public profession of Jesus as Lord, which means if He is Lord, no one else is.





Finally, it is a commitment to cooperate with the grace of the Holy Spirit in our bodies to live faithfully to all that Jesus has commanded. Does that mean we won't struggle and fall from time to time? Of course we will!

But there's a big difference between struggling and remaining defiantly opposed to how the Lord calls us to live. And as Monsignor Shea from the University of Mary is fond of saying: so long as we never give up, so long as we never quit, so long as we always keep trying and ask the Lord's forgiveness, we always win! Because we know the end of the story already.





As we enter in this Eastertide (50 days starting on Easter Sunday and ending on Pentecost Sunday), let us do so fully aware of what we're celebrating: Jesus has triumphed over Death, Sin and Satan. And let us take seriously the questions we were asked at Easter, and the pledge of allegiance we made to Jesus, our Lord."





A Legacy of Purpose, A Future of Possibility

Corpus Christi College and St. Mark's College are the two Catholic colleges affiliated with the University of British Columbia (UBC). These two colleges—distinct yet deeply connected—offer a transformative academic and spiritual experience rooted in the Catholic intellectual tradition—an experience that empowers students to lead lives of purpose and build a better future.

Our Story

Founded in 1956 by the Basilian Fathers, St. Mark's College is our Graduate School of Theology and was established to offer theological education through an affiliation agreement with the University of British Columbia. That same year, the B.C. Legislature passed An Act Respecting St. Mark's College, authorizing the College to confer its theological degrees (B.A., M.A., Ph.D.).

In 1999, inspired by the Archdiocese of Vancouver's Synod Let Us Act (1998–2006), Corpus Christi College was established by lay leaders to bring the richness of the Catholic intellectual and liberal arts traditions into undergraduate education.

With the departure of the Basilians in 2005, both colleges came under the direct ecclesiastical sponsorship of the



Archdiocese of Vancouver and under the auspices of the Jesuits of Canada. Today, a shared Board of Directors governs both institutions, with the Archbishop of Vancouver serving as Chancellor and guarantor of their Catholic mission and identity.

Corpus Christi College offers the first two years of university through its Associate of Arts degree, with more than 100 fully transferable courses in Arts, Sciences, and Business. Students transition seamlessly to UBC, SFU, and other leading institutions in Canada and beyond. Whether pursuing a pathway to the UBC's Sauder School of Business, a career in Nursing, Healthcare, Science, Psychology, the Creative Arts or a future in Education, students receive the foundation and mentorship they need to succeed. We don't just prepare students academically—we help them grow as leaders, thinkers, and people of purpose. Others pursue our Bachelor of Arts in Theology and Culture—a program co-offered with St. Mark's—before transitioning to UBC's Bachelor of Education and becoming teachers in both public and Catholic schools.

St. Mark's College, our graduate school of theology, offers dynamic, largely online programs in Theological Studies, Pastoral Studies, Religious Education, and Catholic Educational Leadership.

These programs serve teachers, lay ministers, deacon candidates, and parish volunteers across British Columbia. With the support of scholarships—many funded by the Archdiocese—students deepen their understanding of the faith and apply it to their lives, professions, and ministries.

In a recent interview on the podcast Catholic Education Matters, Archbishop Miller noted that more needed to be done to help in the formation of teachers in the Catholic school system, and St. Mark's provides that support and formation.

An Experience Like No Other

When we say our students get "the best of both worlds," we mean it. At Corpus Christi, our small class sizes foster personal relationships between faculty and students. Our 400 students benefit from a close-knit, values-driven community, enriched by daily Mass, Campus Ministry, and a strong culture of mentorship, volunteering, and service.

At the same time, thanks to our formal affiliation with UBC, our students enjoy full access to the resources of one of Canada's top research universities—from world-class libraries and lecture series to athletics, student clubs, and more. This dual experience is rare—and powerful.

Our students excel far beyond the classroom. Locally, our students volunteer weekly in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside, support the unhoused, serve in parishes, and lead city-wide initiatives. From charitable startups to artistic contributions at Bard on the Beach and athletic events like UBC's Storm the Wall, or participating in the UBC football team, our students graduate with not just knowledge—but also compassion, courage, and character.

I for one would be a moral disaster: arrogant, ungrateful, unyielding. And very far from God.

When I was young, as an example, I was fascinated with money and the acquisition of wealth, assuming that it would make me very happy. Money was my god. And if I hadn't been knocked off course by the mercy of God, I'd be in a world of hurt. "What does it profit a man to gain the whole world, and forfeit his soul?"

In life and in work it's tempting to begrudge failures and unmet hopes. These experiences can be painful, to be sure. But I've noticed that they can also be deeply fruitful, even essential. Here are some of the positive results I've experienced:

Humility

Humility can be defined as living in the truth about yourself–not more nor less. Failure can remind us of our "creatureliness", that we aren't perfect, that we have needs, that we must depend on God and others. And that God and others can be depended upon! This is really good for us. Humble people are happy people.

Appreciation

For what you have that you took for granted when all was going well. Challenges invite us to recognize past successes. For example, perhaps revenue is down. Was it up before, and do you have savings from it? Be grateful for that.

Also be grateful for the people in your life willing to help you. I'm always amazed by this. People like to help!

Learning

- 1. What you can do differently or better
- 2. How you can be better Good stuff!

Resilience

Discomfort amidst challenges isn't the worst thing. And getting more familiar with it, and not being crushed by it, builds strength of character. The process isn't fun, but the outcome is very useful

Hope

"In all things God works for the good of those who love Him," including business challenges and failures. Seeing that work itself in time strengthens one's confidence in God. Things could be worse!

So my invitation: welcome challenges and failures. They may be the best thing to happen to you.

THE CCE OVERVIEW

The Centre for Christian Engagement is grounded in a basic principle of our Catholic faith: that every person is a beloved creation of God. We also share the belief of St. Augustine that "you have formed us for yourself, and our hearts are restless till they find rest in you" (St. Augustine of Hippo, Confessions, 1,1.5). The Centre was created in order to express God's love for each person and to explore why people were often dis-engaging from the Church and the joy of the Gospel when we believe that the answers they are seeking can be found within the Church. It was founded in order to listen to people's needs and desires and hear their most profound questions.


More than fifty years after the close of the Second Vatican Council, Pope Francis lead a renewal of the Church that was deeply embedded within the Catholic intellectual tradition, which emphasizes that learning means discovering and growing in the truth. It builds on his formation in the Argentinian "Theology of the People", which understands "the honest and sincere love of God practiced by people at the local level might inform the theological understanding and religious behaviour of the global church." Francis' first Apostolic Exhortation,

Evangelii Gaudium (2013), represented his blueprint for this renewal. It calls for the creation of a "culture of encounter", and for the Church to become "a place of mercy freely given, where everyone can feel welcome, loved, forgiven and encouraged to live the good life of the Gospel."

Established with founding donations from the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Vancouver, Peter Bull, Angus Reid, and Andy Szocs in 2019, St. Mark's College at UBC launched the Centre for Christian Engagement to

- Build a culture of encounter and dialogue for Christians and the Catholic Church locally and globally;
- Bridge and create engagement between the Academy with the wider society and those interested in faith;
- Create relevant resources to encourage faith journeys;
- Provide forums via public lectures, retreats, panel discussions, podcasts, debates, conferences, and online material to address the issues and challenges that have led to disengagement and to build and encourage Christian engagement in culture;
- Encourage "prophetic voices of the age" to bring the message of Jesus to the Church and the world;
- Highlight the unique and important experiences, voices, and narratives of those who have been marginalized in the Church or the world which includes women, those who are disabled, First Nations/Indigenous peoples, migrants, refugees, and those living in poverty;
- Speak to the degradation of the environmental and spiritual environment to which Pope Francis spoke in his 2015 encyclical Laudato Si';
- Provide safe learning spaces for ecumenical and interfaith dialogue.







I began as the inaugural Director of the Centre for Christian Engagement in September 2021. Since I began directing the Centre in 2021, our work has brought Pope Francis's vision of building a culture of encounter and dialogue for Christians and the Catholic Church locally and globally to life. The Centre has represented Canada at CELAM in Bogota, Columbia to discuss theology on the peripheries with Latin American theologians, and I just returned from Rio de Janeiro and the Vatican sponsored conference on Laudato Si' called "10 years of Laudato Si': Ecological Debt and Public Hope." At this conference representatives of over 200 universities gathered in Rio de Janeiro at PUC (Pontifical Catholic University) to discuss climate change and the 10th anniversary of Laudato Si'. Organized by Emilce Cuda of the Pontifical Commission on Latin America, this meeting had the blessing of the late Pope Francis and our new Pope Leo XIV. Pope Leo sent his first ever video greeting to the conference attendees.

The Centre for Christian Engagement at St. Mark's College at UBC was the only Canadian representative at this important meeting.

Attendees all gave various short talks throughout the conference representing their region of the world and the concerns of their own country. These were not lectures but talks designed to create discussion. These synodal discussions took place in small working groups over four days where attendees produced ideas and suggestions for action. I spoke on the need to learn from indigenous people on the care for creation in Canada.

The conference created not just plans for action by various Catholic and public universities throughout the Americas, Portugal, and Spain, but numerous international connections that will allow the work of Laudato Si' to move forward. The CCE looks forward to working with many new international partners on bringing the hope of Laudato Si' to the world and we have already connected with partners in Brazil, Portugal, and Spain.

We have also hosted amazing scholars such as Cathy Clifford, Massimo Faggioli, and Sr. Damien Marie Savino and brought in First Nations speakers such as Nigiian Sinclair and Ray Aldred to speak about the work of reconciliation and indigenous care for creation here at home. Due to the generosity of donors, we established a Laudato Si'endowment to explore the spiritual and environmental concerns of Pope Francis outlined in his 2015 encyclical. Our goal is bridge and create engagement between the Academy with the wider society and those interested in faith, including ecumenical and interfaith partners in dialogue and events. All of our lectures are available free to the public and they stream on the St. Mark's College You Tube channel

(https://www.youtube.com/@st.markscollegeatubc9587/videos).

The Centre for Christian Engagement has also hosted two major international conferences. The first, from May 4-6, 2023, was focused on Pope Francis and the second, just completed May 1-3, 2025, was on the Promise of Christian Education. These conferences attracted over 40 presenters from around the world and locally. We had presenters from Africa, Asia, Europe, and all throughout North America discuss the most significant Catholic topics of the day. These conferences have brought us not just international attention, but allowed our faculty and students to connect with scholars all over the world. In addition, at our most recent conference on education, four of our St. Mark's theology graduate students, all teachers in local Catholic school systems, presented original research on what it means to be Catholic educators today.



Through public lectures, retreats, panel discussions, podcasts, conferences, and webinars we address the issues and challenges that have led to disengagement and to build and encourage Christian engagement in culture. We have done this on a bi-weekly basis through our podcast What Matters Most in which expert guests from Vancouver, Canada, and throughout the world explore Catholic, Christian, and interfaith spirituality. What Matters Most is focused on listening to people and what is on their minds, particularly dealing with the big questions of religion and spirituality. Our programming is intended for all interested parties, Catholic or not. In the What Matters Most podcast, we talk to people, some well-known, some not so well-known, some Catholic, some Christian, some not affiliated with any religion, some affiliated with other faiths (Muslims, Sikhs) to find out what matters to them. It is a podcast focused on spirituality and faith, but truly focused on listening to others, to learning from those connected to the Church and to those who are not.

It is grounded in personal conversations that ask guests to talk about what has motivated their vocations or their work and what gives their lives meaning and purpose. The format can best be described as a conversation that allows us to get to know our guests.

We want to engage with people on questions of meaning, purpose, and hope. We want to bring Catholic intellectual tradition to bear on the most important questions and challenges of our age. 



THE JUBILEE YEAR 2025

A TIME OF RENEWAL AND CELEBRATION

Archbishop Miller stated, "Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, The Jubilee Year of Hope is a profoundly significant and grace-filled year for our Archdiocese. It offers us unique opportunities to deepen our relationship with God and one another. Pope Francis encourages us to be 'pilgrims of hope' on our journey to the Father's House (cf. John 14:2). In this Pastoral Letter, I wish to share with you the blessings of this Jubilee Year and inspire you to strengthen your hope in Christ."

As we celebrate the year 2025, the Catholic Church is currently engaged in a significant event: the Jubilee Year. This year holds profound meaning for Catholics around the world, representing a time of grace, renewal, and reconciliation. The Jubilee Year is a special occasion that occurs every 25 years, inviting the faithful to reflect on their spiritual lives, seek forgiveness, and engage in acts of charity and service.

What is a Jubilee Year?

The concept of a Jubilee Year has its roots in the Old Testament, where it is established as a time of liberation and restoration. According to Leviticus 25, every 50th year is a Jubilee, during which debts are forgiven, slaves are freed, and land is returned to its original owners. We encourage parishes, schools, and individuals to participate in the celebrations and contribute to the spirit of renewal and reconciliation.

Catholics in the Archdiocese of Vancouver can receive a plenary indulgence during the 2025 Jubilee Year by visiting one of three designated pilgrimage sites: Holy Rosary Cathedral (Vancouver), St. Jude's Parish and Shrine (Vancouver), or St. Anthony of Padua Parish and Shrine of Santo Niño de Cebu (Agassiz).

To obtain the indulgence, pilgrims must:

- ·Be detached from sin (even venial)
- ·Visit a designated pilgrimage site
- ·Participate in Mass or another prayer (e.g., Rosary, Way of the Cross)
- ·Go to Confession (within about 20 days)
- ·Pray for the Pope's intentions

The indulgence is available through December 28, 2025.

The Jubilee Year 2025 is a momentous occasion that invites us to reflect on our faith, seek forgiveness, and engage in acts of service. As we celebrate this year of grace, let us open our hearts to the transformative power of God's love and commit ourselves to living out the Gospel in our daily lives. COMING TO KNOW A GREAT SAINT FOR ORDINARY LIFE ~INTRODUCTION TO OPUS DEI~

The saints are the permanent Catechesis given to us by God over the course of history. The saints, in fact, are the ever-new translation of the Word of God into human life; in the saints, the Word becomes life, flesh, and blood... (Pope Benedict XVI).

I am ever grateful for these treasures of the Church, the Communion of Saints. These friends of ours in heaven lived a life of heroic virtue that was proven by miracles and meticulous study of their lives. We can ask them to intercede for us here on earth, and teach us by their example how to live as other Christs.

St. Josemaria Escriva Balaguer, the founder of Opus Dei, was canonized October 6,2002, by Pope John Paul II before a crowd of nearly half a million people. He is a saint for the modern world. St. Josemaria Escriva dedicated his life to spreading the message that all people are called to holiness - regardless of their profession, social status or life circumstances.

In Pope John Paul II homily at the canonization Mass, St. Josemaria is described as "the saint of ordinary life." The Pope emphasized that Escriva's message was profoundly relevant in the modern era: that everyday work and the ordinary duties of a lay person could be sanctified and offered to God. The Pope underscored that this message resonated with the Second Vatican Council's universal call to holiness, which Escriva had anticipated decades earlier. His teachings offered a path of spiritual growth for lay people who often struggled to reconcile faith and professional life.





In Escriva's

vision, work was not merely a means to make a living - it was a place for encountering God. This message resonated with lay people (fathers and mothers, single, young and older, professionals, farm workers, taxi drivers, students...) who yearn to live meaningful, faith-filled lives without withdrawing from the world. He said, "Understand this well: there is something holy, something divine, hidden in the most ordinary situation, and it is up to each one of you to discover it."

The teachings of St. Josemaria are condensed into short points in three small books called The Way, The Furrow and The Forge. These books greatly assist our personal prayer as they deal with everyday topics we are all concerned about: living the

virtues better, developing a deeper sacramental life, growing in our relationship as children of God, and sharing our faith in friendship.



An example from The Way, point 659, "The cheerfulness you should have is not the kind we might call physiological good spirits - the happiness of a healthy animal. You must seek something more: the supernatural happiness that comes from abandoning everything, including your own self, into the loving arms of our Father-God."

There are two other books containing Escriva's homilies, Friends of God and Christ is Passing By and two reflection books: Holy Rosary and The Way of the Cross.

These are wonderful sources to help anyone who wants to develop a more intimate spiritual life. See www.escrivaworks.org for a full text of all the books.

Activities are organized separately for men (Glenwood) and women (Headford (Crestwell)) as men and women have different roles in life. Some of these initiatives are clubs, seminars, courses and camps.

Opus Dei offers spiritual recollections once a month to men, women, senior highschool students, university students, O young professionals throughout the Lower Mainland. Monthly recollections are like a mini retreat - two hours out of the busyness of our daily

lives. It is a time to renew our relationship with God and learn more about how to love others. Recollections are composed of a meditation by a priest, a talk on some aspect of living a Christian life, adoration of the Blessed Sacrament and time for confession. Retreats, workshops and seminars are held at Copper Ridge Conference Centre (Copper Ridge Conference Centre) in beautiful Britannia Beach, overlooking the Sea to Sky mountains and glaciers.






MENTAL HEALTH AND FAITH

Recently, at St. Anne's Catholic Church in Saskatoon, 151 high school students gathered to hear me speak on mental health and faith. Equipped with terminology from my own teens, I began.

"Hey Sigmas, let's take a second to stop mewing, bet? Tone down the rizz, and hear from me, a cringe not-so-Karen who cares about you and your mental health, because God cares about you and your mental health. This conversation is fire. No ick. No cap"

Indeed, my ridiculous attempt to use their language, which due to technology and social media evolves more quickly and widely than any previous generation's slang, caught their attention and invited them into conversation. For the next 45 minutes, a pin drop could be heard, as together we addressed questions today's youth are asking about their struggles, their identity, and God's presence in their lives.

Did you know that, according to the World Health Organization, half of all lifetime mental health conditions begin by age 14, and three-quarters by age 24? These are formative years when faith, identity, and belonging are also being shaped. Young people are increasingly in need of sanctuaries, places where they can find both spiritual nurture and mental health support.

According to The Open Generation Report, today's youth seek churches and faith communities that engage openly with mental health, recognizing it as one of their primary concerns. Yet recent research reveals that only 34% of young people talk to adults about their mental health, even as they discuss it among themselves. Two-thirds of young people shared that the trusted adults in their lives don't know the full extent of the mental health suffering they are experiencing.

Although this generation is more mental health literate than any generation before them, they want for skills, practices, and understanding which build connection and resilience.

Undeniably, youth are talking about mental health amongst themselves, but have we equipped them to reflect well, assured them of our desire to walk alongside them, and helped them to infuse experiences of languishing with hope?

As members of the Body of Christ, we are called to care for the whole person—mind, body, and soul. The Church holds a unique role in responding to the mental health crisis. Whilst clinical settings focus primarily on symptom management, our faith communities can offer what is desperately needed: belonging, purpose, connection, and hope. We can present a framework for understanding experiences of languishing within a larger narrative of redemption. Yes, anxiety, depression, and mental ill-health exist at higher statistical rates than ever before, but young people's identity cannot be not defined by their symptoms. Our Sigma youth are beloved children of our compassionate God. Mental health challenges are not spiritual failures. Through tradition and scripture, our Lord reveals deep concern for both emotional well-being and our spiritual state.

In seeking to equip churches for this unique role, our Vancouver-based team at Sanctuary Mental Health Ministries has launched The Sanctuary Youth Series—a free, groundbreaking resource to support the mental, emotional, and spiritual well-being of young Christians.





Designed for youth ages 11 to 15, it is suitable for Catholic schools, parish youth groups, and sacramental preparation programs. This series brings the wisdom of the faith into dialogue with the realities of mental health. In doing so, it offers youth not only the freedom to seek help, but the reassurance that they are never alone—God is with them, whether they are flourishing or struggling.

This resource is built around the three pillars of theology, psychology and lived experience. It includes:

- Eight short films featuring stories of young Christians who have experienced mental health challenges
- A facilitation guide for youth leaders and catechists
- Interactive exercises and downloadable activities for youth
- A guide for parents and caregivers to support their young person's journey
- Opportunities for prayer, reflection, and Scripture on key themes related to mental health

Following my time with the St. Anne's youth, a young man approached me. A quiet, wellspoken, hockey enthusiast, he shared that his youth group had just finished The Sanctuary Youth Series. When I inquired how it had gone, his grin widened, and he said, "They were the best conversations our youth group ever had... God really does care." We've seen a consistent response from youth; there is a profound sense of relief when given permission to discuss mental health in the context of faith. What a gift it is to witness young people recognize that their mental health struggles do not separate them from God, but can, in fact, be spaces where Divine compassion and connection are experienced most deeply.

O merciful and loving God, grant us the grace to walk with our youth in their joys and struggles, showing them that their lives matter deeply—to us and to you. Bet.
